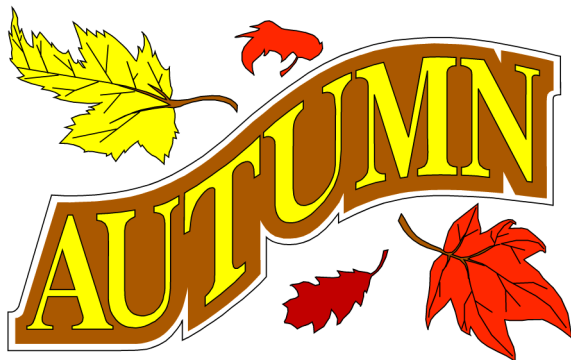
Ice Cream Social & Member's Night

SEPTEMBER FIELD TRIP *by Rita Topp*

This trip will be one week earlier than the usual weekend. We will be headed to an area near Payson on Saturday September 17, to collect Brainstone Nodules and Fossils. The Brainstones are usually solid with a few exceptions that have a small cavity with crystal points. These nodules are plentiful and range from 1 inch to 4 inches in size. We will stay at the collecting site for about three hours. Keep your eyes open for the Fossils which are in the same area.

Samples of the Brainstone and Fossils will be available to view the morning of our trip. We will meet in the McDonald's parking lot at the HWY 260 exit off of I-17 at 9 AM and leave at 9:15 AM for the collecting location.

Bring a rock hammer or a small spade, gloves, sunscreen, snacks, drinking water and a hat. Don't forget your containers for your finds. You can pack your lunch or we can continue our new tradition of going out for lunch after the dig. The Riverside Grill is not far from the turn off of Hwy 87 in Pine, they have a wide variety of food to choose from.

October Has Two Field Trips:

Trip #1

The 70th annual Gem-O-Rama put on by Searles Lake Gem and Mineral Society will be held October 8 and 9, 2011. They have a really good show plus lead three fun filled field trips.

On Saturday October 8th there are two trips: The Mud Trip (Saturday AM) - you'll find cluster and barrel Hanksite in black mud. Cost \$10.00 per car. The Blow Hole (Saturday PM) - you be collecting Hanksite, Halite and Borax, from the surface. Cost \$10.00 per car.

On Sunday October 9th: Pink Halite Trip (Sunday AM) - wading in knee deep to waist deep briny water to collect the crusty Halite crystals. Cost \$15.00 per car.

You may think this seems expensive, but to really see what all is involved in the preparation for this event you

have to visit their website: www1.iwvisp.com/tronagemclub/GEM-O-RAMA.htm Renting equipment and hiring crews is not cheap. This really is a fun couple of days; I know from first-hand experience. The kid in me still likes to play in the mud and wade in puddles.

The website has everything you need to know, and what you need to bring to each of the field trips. For anyone not wanting to collect their own Halite Crystals they are available to purchase from the sales room.

Anyone wanting to go as a group will meet in the parking lot of the Best Western Motel, 400 South China Lake Blvd. Ridgecrest CA. We will leave the motel parking lot at 7:15 AM, drive to the event, park and register, as well as purchase our tickets for the trips.

I must emphasize the need to visit the website to get valuable information about this event. You will find information about motels, camping, brine to wash your Hanksite in, supplies needed, and also information about their show and food vendors.

No need to sign up for this event - just show up in the parking lot of the Best Western Motel by 7:15 AM on the 8th of October or head over on your own.

Below is a summary of the summer's traditional birthstones:

June	Pearl, Alexandrite, Moonstone
July	Ruby, Carnelian
August	Peridot, Sardonyx, Carnelian, Diamond
September	Sapphire, Crysolite, Agate, Lapis
